Friday 6 December 2013 Plymouth University

On December 6th a conference focusing on human reproductive experiences will take place at Plymouth University. The conference is organised by Professor Gayle Letherby and Dr Tony Gilbert on behalf of the Centre for Health and Social Care Innovations (Plymouth University), the British Sociological Association (BSA) South West Regional Medical Sociology Group and the BSA Human Reproduction Study Group. A plenary talk will be given by Dr Joanne (Bob) Whalley (Falmouth University). Bob is a Senior Lecturer in theatre and her current research interests focus on research methodologies in practice-as-research, the processes and relational practices of collaborative performance and devised theatre making. Current practice-as-research writing is informed by witnessing durational performance art/live art/body art practices, and the exploration of a radical domesticity. Bob's paper will be an auto/biographical performance of her experience of pregnancy loss.
